Mark's Reflection

Being Salt and Light

In the opening chapter of Jesus' teaching in the Gospel of Matthew, he turns to ordinary images from everyday life: salt and light. Both are small things, easily overlooked—yet both are essential.

Salt works quietly. It preserves, brings out flavour, and stops decay. Jesus' words remind us that Christian faith is not meant to be loud or showy for its own sake, but faithful and steady. When the Church lives with integrity, compassion, and truth, it helps hold back what diminishes life and brings out what is good in our communities. When salt loses its taste, Jesus warns, it becomes useless—not because it is small, but because it no longer does what it was made to do.

Light, on the other hand, is visible. It does not exist for itself, but to help others see. Jesus tells his followers not to hide their light, but to let it shine so that others may see their good works and give glory to God. This is not a call to self-promotion, but to faithful witness—acts of kindness, justice, mercy, and hope that point beyond ourselves to God.

Together, salt and light remind us that discipleship is both quiet and courageous. In our homes, workplaces, schools, and neighbourhoods, God calls us to live in such a way that the world is preserved from harm and illuminated with hope. We do not create the light—that comes from Christ—but we are invited to reflect it.

As we go about the ordinary days ahead, may we ask: where is God calling us to bring flavour where life feels bland, and light where shadows remain? And may our lives, in small but faithful ways, draw others toward the goodness of God.
